Health

Update (3 Feb 2010)

- Vaccination campaign started in hospitals and temporary settlements on 2 Feb.³
- PAHO/WHO has begun an assessment of major health facilities in Port-au-Prince affected by the earthquake. The assessment is looking at medical equipment available in these facilities and whether or not it is in working condition. The final report of this assessment mission should be ready at the end of this week.⁵

Food

2,000,000 in need of food⁶

Update (3 Feb 2010)

- More than 460,000 people were reached since 31 January through the new fixed distribution sites set up across Port-au-Prince. 600,000 reached prior to the surge.⁷
- WFP is aiming to deliver a 25kg rice ration to at least two million people across the city over a two-week period.⁷
- Beneficiaries are given coupons carrying a date and distribution point where they can be exchanged for a rice ration.⁷

Update (4 Feb 2010)

- The focus is shifting to the urgent need for transitional shelter that can tide people through the upcoming rainy season. This would include tarpaulins, plastic sheeting, tools and ropes that provide more weather-proof and durable shelter.⁸
- Seven organized settlements are up and running, one of them covering over 20,000 persons.¹⁰

Water and Sanitation

532,000 people with access to water¹¹

25,000 portable toilets are necessary to support 500,000 people in Port-au-Prince¹¹

294 water distribution points¹¹

35 organizations¹²

Update (2 Feb 2010)

- The highest priority for the cluster remains sanitation and the strengthening of monitoring systems for sanitation activities. So far, 750 pit latrines have been built by cluster partners in Port-au-Prince, Jacmel, and Léogâne and about 100 portable toilets have been installed.¹¹
